PRINCIPLES OF WRITING

U11 101M ECOMP

Online version of the course U11 101. This course is about reading well and writing deliberately and sees those two acts as intimately related. Students will read as writers, studying the strategies that writers use to write persuasively, and practicing those strategies in their own writing. The course offers a method for close reading (based on finding meaningful patterns); it offers practice linking claims with evidence for those claims and it offers practice organizing papers using such skills as well-written summaries, theses, transitions, topic sentences, and paragraphs. This course is fully online. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

CRITICAL AND RESEARCHED WRITING

U11 203M ECOMP

Online version of the course U11 203. This course teaches students to engage critically with scholarship, construct convincing arguments, and write persuasive research papers. We will study how other writers achieve these goals, then use a proven model of researched writing to write an argument and paper about a text of your own choosing that includes accurate use of primary and secondary sources. Concentrating on a single research project throughout the semester, attention will be given to revision and organization, library research strategies, academic citation conventions, and electronic search engines and sources. Prereq: U11-101 or its equivalent. Restricted to University College students. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

QUANTITATIVE REASONING

U03 117 GS

The objective of this course is to help students develop the ability to reason and think quantitatively and critically in order to make informed decisions on issues that they will confront in personal life and life as a citizen. It will provide students with the quantitative skills needed in future college course work and careers. In addition, it will emphasize written and oral communication. This course is fully online. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

INTRO TO WORLD HISTORY: CHINA AND THE SILK ROAD: THEN AND NOW

U16 164 HIST

The ancient "Silk Roads" that connected China with Europe (130 BCE-1453 CE) also included trade routes through Asia, the Middle East and Africa. Silk and other goods, arts, religion, cultures, ideas and technology were transferred on these routes and later on interconnected water routes during the Age of Discovery (1453-1660 CE). In the 21st century, the Silk Road is the basis for new global trade routes, tourism, and cultural exchange and even the growth of new cities. In examining current news articles and announcements, students will be asked to also assess bias and propaganda versus the actual benefits or disadvantages to the various countries involved in the new trade routes. This course is fully online. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

THE AMERICAN SOUTH IN BLACK AND WHITE

U16 2161 HIST

This course explores the history of the American South from the colonial era to the present, focusing on the interplay between black and white cultures. Topics include Southern plantation life, the Civil War, Jim Crow, Southern music, and the Civil Rights Movement. Using film, photography, and other media, the course also considers representations of the South in popular culture. Particular attention is paid to how images and stereotypes of the South have evolved and to how the region's history has influenced the nation as a whole. This course is fully online. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

APPLIED STATISTICS

U20 205 MATH

This is a first course in statistics with examples and applications from a variety of disciplines, and emphasis on the social, behavioral, and natural sciences. Students learn about key topics and statistical methods that may be applied to areas such as economics, mathematics, psychology, business, and health sciences, to name a few. The course provides a foundation in descriptive and inferential statistics, and in probability. This course may be applied to University College majors in economics, managerial economics, mathematics, and political science. Prereq: college algebra. BIOMEDICAL ETHICS

U22 233 PHIL

In light of contemporary moral disagreements and traditional ethical theories, we will examine some of the moral issues arising out of medical practice and experimentation. Some topics we may cover include issues regarding the doctor-patient relationship, informed consent, abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, stem cell research, cloning, and health care rationing. This course is fully online. 3 units. Tuition: \$1,995.00.

ONLINE REFRESHER SPANISH I

U27 106 SPAN

This fully online, accelerated course covers basic conversational and reading skills and serves as an introduction to Latin American culture. The course uses key grammar, vocabulary, and cultural content of Spanish 112 and 113. We use the Internet, videos, and textbooks to complete an elementary level Spanish grammar review. While the course is intended for students with previous training in Spanish, it does not replace the Spanish 101-102 sequence in the College of A&S. Prereq: One semester of college Spanish or one year of high school Spanish. Heritage speakers welcome. This course may not count toward the minor or major in Spanish offered through the Department of Romance Languages and Literatures in the day school. This course is fully online. 3 units.
