Daily Schedule

Throughout the day, students will participate in a variety of activities which include lecture, small group work, discussion, hands-on activities, guest lectures, and organized field trips. A sample day in the life of an institute student is

7:30-9:00am: Wake-up and breakfast on campus

9:00am-12:00pm: Morning session

12:00-1:30pm: Lunch break on campus

1:30-3:30pm: Afternoon session

3:30-5:00pm: Independent study/academic support time*

5:00-6:00pm: College readiness seminars

6:00-9:00pm: Dinner, free time allotted off campus, program sponsored social events

9:00pm: In the building curfew

11:00pm: In the room curfew

*Please note that independent study time for Pre-Medical and Pre-Engineering Institutes are typically in the morning from 11:00am-12:00pm, and the afternoon session lasts from 1:30-4:30pm.
